He became a board member 14 years ago simply because he wanted to be of service to the Jewish community. Joshua took over as president at the height of the pandemic when being involved with a 24/7 organization was very difficult. He has been available to anyone and everyone in the organization to assist with whatever they need. This has included delivering critical PPE supplies and meeting with government, staff and funders. If it needed to be done, he was there to do it.</p> <p>Through the course of Joshau’s term, JARC has cut their overtime by nearly two thirds resulting in financial stability. Joshua is the epitome of kindness and never considers position in how he approaches people. He treats every person with the highest respect and regard. He is as happy to talk to someone prepping meals in the JARC homes as he is to meet with a senator. This has made him equally accessible to the people served, front line staff, donors and board members.</p>

Inspired by her brother, Barry, who had a disability, in 2009 Loren had a vision to build a program to create access to the workforce for adults with disabilities. For the next 18 months, she and a team of dedicated volunteers curated by Loren worked tirelessly to build (and fundraise) for what is now RAISE (Recognizing Abilities and Inclusion of Special Employees), a work and social skills training program for adults with disabilities. Loren is the sole fundraiser for RAISE.</p> <p>While Shalom Orlando has a full time RAISE director on staff, Loren dedicates endless hours each week fundraising and strategizing with the RAISE director. Loren is at Shalom Orlando so often that many do not know that she is a lay leader. Seeing how impactful RAISE was in Central Florida, Loren does not want to stop there; she envisions bringing RAISE to many other communities nationwide.</p>
14	<p><b>Marie Raftery</b> Jewish Family Service of San Diego</p>	<p>Marie is a Director on the JFS Board. She has been involved with the agency for 24 years. She joined the Board in 2014 and in 2017 was asked to be Chair. During her tenure as Chair, she oversaw the launch of the Centennial Countdown Campaign, which secured its final pledges last year, \$50 million for critical community services. 27	<p><b>Sandi Helfman Wolf</b> Alexander Jewish Family Service Houston</p>	<p>Over the 11 years of her involvement with Alexander JFS, Sandi’s passion and leadership significantly transformed board engagement, fundraising success, marketing messaging and several internal processes. Sandi served as Auction Chair for a Gala, the Event Chair for a Gala, as VP of Development, and President of the Agency. She also led a project to promote the public’s awareness and knowledge about the 988 national hotline for mental health emergencies. Sandi pressed the agency to tell its story through clients’ own words. This practice has become the centerpiece of the annual gala, which grew from raising \$350,000 per event to one which brings in over \$2,000,000 each year.</p> <p>Sandi perfected a process to bring potential donors on tours, developed a corporate sponsorship program, and created a fundraising board. As President, she focused on the processes that would sustain the growth of the agency, from creating job descriptions for the board executive committee positions to creating a centralized email address to allow Board members to better assist the development team to maintain an accurate and up-to-date donor database. She introduced segmented marketing, facilitating addressing different donor groups. She also instituted a new award called the Alexander JFS Community Investment Award, given to companies with a demonstrated track record of involvement and support and who use their circles of influence to encourage their partners to support the agency. Sandi infuses everything she takes on with meaning, energy, and fun. Her confidence and passion for the work of the agency has drawn hundreds of new supporters and volunteers to support the work of Alexander JFS.</p>
28	<p><b>Stuart Rudoler</b> American Friends of Elwyn</p>	<p>Stuart has been involved with American Friends of Elwyn for 30 years.
